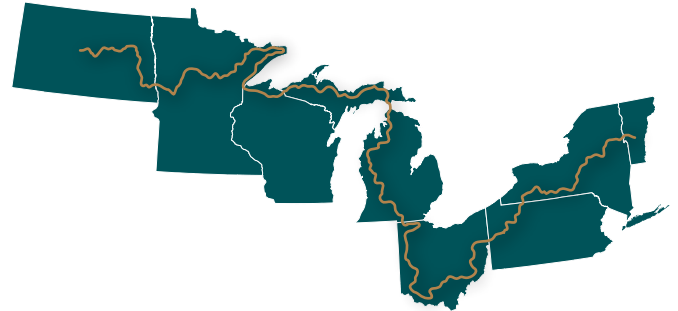




North Country National Scenic Trail Overview

Overview

The North Country National Scenic Trail provides nationally significant recreation experiences as it traverses, interprets, and celebrates the unique natural, historic, cultural, and ecological landscapes of America's northern heartlands. Stretching 4,800 miles, the North Country Trail is the longest in the National Trails System. Anchored in the west at Lake Sakakawea in North Dakota, the trail passes through eight states, 10 National Forests, and more than 150 other public land areas on the path to its eastern terminus where it meets the Appalachian Trail in Vermont. The North Country Trail is managed by the National Park Service in concert with its partner, the North Country Trail Association (NCTA). Together, we plan, build, promote, and protect the North Country Trail.

- The longest of 11 National Scenic Trails
- 40% of Americans live within a day's drive
- Traverses more than 100 counties
- Links eight states, 10 National Forests, and 150+ federal, state, and local public lands
